

### WHITFORD COAT OF ARMS

The coat of arms is recorded in Burke's General Armory as: argent, a bend between two cotises sable, in chief a garb of the last. Crest: a Pigeon on top of a wheat garb proper. Motto: Tout EST d'en HAUT.

It perhaps goes back to the fourteenth century, when the shields were plain, and usually held but one symbol.

The Shield of Argent signifies purity and justice; the Bend or Shield suspender of the Knight is a bearing of high honor, and denotes defense and protection.

The Garb, or Wheat Sheaves mean plenty, and that the first bearer deserved much for his generous hospitality in his home in Scotland. A Garb also denotes that, The Harvest of our hopes has been secured.

The Pigeor or Dove means appealing innocense, harmless, and a ready helper with a swift message.

The Motto: was usually adopted later, being added to the Shield by the family, or friends. Tout EST d'en HAUT, reads; "From It's Heights", "All Comes From Above", or best translation "Heaven Provides".

This is the ceat of arms I have drawn up from my copy of The Whitford Papers. It reads,

"Sir Adam registered arms February 29th, 1704, being described as 'eldest son of James Whitefoord of Dundaff, and heir served and returned, to John Whitefoord, late Blaguhan, his uncle, descended of the family of Whitefoord of ilk."


The arms are, Argent a bend cotised sable, between two garbs gules, that in base being added for difference. Crest a garb er standing upright and thereon a deve proper.

Motte, "Tout est d'en haut."

Note the part underlined. I believe that Sir Adam added the lower garb to indicate difference from his uncle's arms. This could explain the difference from my coat of arms and the one that you have. Maybe also the motte.

This is a coat of arms drawn up from another description given in my copy of the papers.


"Having no authentic evidence of his descent, Mr. Whiteford in March 1840, obtained a grant from the college of arms of this coat, Viz: Argent, a bend sable, cotised azure, between two garbs of the last; and for his crest; a bend sable, cotised of the first; ever the crest, the motto "Repos Aillieurs, and beneath the shield "Virtute Superanda Fortune".

This Mr. Whiteford must have been descended of the same line as the arms are so similar but not directly related to us. I thought that I would throw it in for general reference, though.

### THE WHITEFORD FAMILY

The first to assume the name of Whitford doubtless derived it from a view of some nearby body of water or stream, the ford looking white as one was crossing over it.

Early records show the Whitford family seated in that part of Scotland (as early as 1265) known as Blariquhan. They were recognized as intelligent, patriotic, and religious.

A man of learning and prominence in this Scottish branch during early times was Walter Whiteford, Bishop of Brechin, named in Burke's General Armory. He was among his countryman an outstanding figure forgiving his best in love, faith, and courage where ever he was needed. His name lives on.

Centuries later, descendants of the Whiteford's in Scotland came among others to the eastern shore of America. Here they settled in the newly occupied area, to establish homes for their families; to labor, live and become a part of the new world.

Our colonial records show that Hartford County, Maryland was formed in 1773, being two years before the American Revolution. In this section of Maryland, some years later lived Doddrige Whitefoord, or Whitford as this name was now spelled. His son, William H. Whitford married Annie Warmock, daughter of Phillip Warmock, wealthy merchant of Hartford County. From this line a group of Whitford branches claim desent.

### Walter Whitford

## Walter (died 1686)

# THE FAMILY OF WHITFORD

Copied from a book known as the Whitford Papers, which was published in England and is now out of print.

The family of Whitefoord (Whiteford) or (Whitford) was originally "of that ilk", a place on the River Cart, about three miles above the Town of Paisley, in Menfrewshire.

The early history of the family is given in Crawford's, page 57 on the authority of a book referred to as the "The Genealogy of White-foord of that ilk, by the accurate and judicious antiquary, Mr. William Hamilton of Winshaw". The original grant of 1263 is recited and a sketch of the family given up to the date of Crawford's History, 1710. It is stated there (p. 310) that the lands of Whitefoord had been sold to the Earl of Dundonald, and by his feud out in parcels, about 1670.

Crawford remarks that the principal branch of this ancient family is Whitefoord of Blaguhan, in Carrick, (Ayrshire) who descended from it several ages ago. "Sir Adam Whitefoord is now (1710) of Blaguhan, baronet. Bryce Whitefoord of Windaff is cousin german to Sir Adam".

The subsequent history of the Whitefoords of Blaguahn is obscure; the notice by Burke in his "Extinct Baronetcies" (p. 638) being meager in extreme.

Blaguhan is understood to be the same place as Blairguhan, now the seat of Sir Edward Hunter Blair, Bart.

The Blaguhan Baronetcy dates from 1701, and was conferred on Sir Adam Whitefoord, December 30th. of that year.

Sir Adam married, sometime before 1715, the Hon. Margaret Cathcart, only daughter of Alan, seventh baron Cathcart, and the Hon. Elizabeth Dalrymple, his wife, daughter of the first viscount. Lady Whitefoord died in 1742, and Sir Adam was buried in the New Church of Ayr, in November 1727

Sir Adam registered arms February 29th. 1704, being described as "eldest son of James Whitefoord of Dunduff, and heir served and returned, to Bohn Whitefoord, late Blaugahan, his uncle, descended of the family of Whitefoord of ilk".

The arms are, Argent a bend cotised sable, between two garbs gules, that in base being added for difference. Crest, a garb or standing upright and thereon a dove proper, Motto, "tout est d'en haut".

John the uncle, died in February 1701, having been served heir, February 4, 1604, of his uncle John in the barony of Blaguhan, which he had acquired.

Sir Adam's quarters on his father's side were, whitefoord, Inglis of Sheill, Kennedy of Drunellan, and Kennedy of Ardmillan; and on his mother's side, Blair of that ilk, Dundass of that ilk, wallace of Anchans and Leslie, Earl of Levan.

Sir Adam left several sons; the order of whose birth is uncertain!

I. James, who in 1734 was gazetted as "Sir James Whitefoord, Bart, to be a captain of Cadogan's Regiment. I apprehend that this a misprint for Sir John, and that there was no Sir James Whitefoord and that the gazette referes to:

III. Charles, who was Sir Adam's "third son"; he married, and had a son Caleb, born in Edinburgh in 1734, who will be referred to hereafter.

In July, 1740, Charles was gazetted as ordered companion to his uncle, Gen. Lord Cathcart, in the intended expedition to America. He was in 1751, gazetted from half pay to calvary regiment in Ireland, and died in Galway in 1753.

Besides Caleb, Colonel Charles left a daughter, Mrs. Smith.

IV. Hew, appointed an ensign in Cathcart's foot, in 1731; he seems to have died in 1741, when on service in the field against Carthagena, "from the inclemency of the climate".

V. Alan (printed also Allen or Alban) was appointed, 1733, Receiver General of the Land Tax for Scotland, and died in 1766, unmarried.

Sir Adam's eldest son was captain in the army in 1723.

Sir Adam was eventually succeeded by his son, Sir John Whitefoord. who married Alice, daughter of John Moore of Tullyhaben in Ireland; who was gazetted a major in 1743; as a colonel in 1750; and as a lieutenant general in 1761. He is termed Sir John Whitefoord, Bart., of Whitefoord. Sir John died in Edingurgh, March 2nd, 1762. His widow died September 29th. 1776.

I have noticed only one son his successor.

Sir John Whitefoord, bart., (3) who married in 1761 (as Captain Whitefoord of the Royal Fusileers), Miss Cartwright, one of the coheiresses of the family of Cartwright of Ossinton, in Nottinghamshire.

In February 1763, he was gazetted to be a major in the 11th. Regiment, and in announcing a birth of a son in October 1764, he is styled Sir John Whitford. He inherited ballochmyle in Ayrshire, on the death, unmarried, of his uncle Allen Whitefoord, March 26th, 1766.

He was alive in 1799, when he was threatened with prosecution in the Lyon Court for assuming supporters; He was dead November 23rd., 1803, when his five daughters were served heirs portioners general, but the eldest, Mrs. Cranstour, succeeded to a remnant of settled property.

I notice the following children of Sir John (3):

I. John, eldest son, died on board the frigate Pamona, off St.
Thomas, October 9th., 1788.

II. James of Dundaff, died at Beestow near Nottinghamshire, August 30th, 1795. He inherited Dunduff and other lands on the death of James, son of Bryce, of Dunduff, younger brother of the first baronet (Adam).

Dunduff and his other properties were united and erected into the barony of Whitefoord, by Brown Charter, in 1702, in favor of the said Bryce, who married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir David Cunnyhame of Milneraig, Bart., and died Jan. 1726.

Although Whitefoord was held by the younger branch, they took the designation "of Dunduff", while the second and third baronets were styled "of Whitefoord" of "that ilk".

The town house of the family in Canongate of Edinburgh, now occupied as a type foundry, retains the name "of Whitefoord House".

On the death of James of Dunduff, his father, Sir John was served heir of provision general to him, but his brother-in-law, Col. Francis Cunnyham, was heir of provision special.

From 1803 to 1825 inclusive, there is no service of an heir male recorded in Scotland.

III. Charles, third son died in Edinburgh, June 6, 1787.

IV. Mary Anne, eldest daughter, married in 1803, to Henry Cranstonn (of the Navy Pay Office, son of Brisbane, and Hon. Geo. Cranstonn, seventh son of fifth Lord Cranstonn.) She was his second wife.

V. Alicia Lucy, second daughter, married Dec. 5, 1765, at Welloton, near Nottinghamshire, the seat of Lord Middleton, to the Hon. Henry Sedley, who was eldest son, by his second wife, Martha Harcourt, of the first Lord Vernon. He had taken the name Sedley in consequence of his second marriage with Elizabeth Rebecca Ann, - only child of Sir Charles Sedley, Bart., of Southfleet. Sir Charles died in 1778. His daughter married Mer. Vernon in 1779.

Mr. Sedley Vernon succeeded his half brother in 1813 as third baron Vernon.

Alice Lucy, Lady Vernon, died in 1827, leaving two sons, whose lines seem to have failed; the present Lord Vernon being descended from the first marriage with Sir Charles Sedley's daughter.

Lord Middleton was uncle by marriage of Alice Lucy Whitefoord, having married Dorothy Cartwright, another of the Casington co-heiresses (the others were Jane, Lady Legard, great grandmother of the present Sir Charles Legard, and Mary, wife of Sir Charles Buck, the last baronet of Hanby).

VI. Henrietta, third daughter, married June 8, 1797, to David Kennedy of Kirkmichael, died Nov. 26, 1810.

VII. Ann, fourth daughter, died unmarried, at Kirkmichael, Feb. 23, 1805.

VIII. Jane, youngest daughter, married July 8, 1805, to Col. Francis Cunnyhame, youngest son of Sir William August Cunnyghame, Bart., of Milneraig. Colonel Francis died September 19, 1816, and his widow died on the same date in the next year.

Sir John Whiteford is the last baronet of the line of Whom I find any notice; I have not ascertained the date of his death; as he was major in 1763 he must have been about 75 years of age at the time of his youngest daughter's marriage.

Failing male issue of Sir John whitefoord, the representation of his family waned, at his decease having apparently developed on Caleb (3) Whitefoord, son of Charles, or his representatives.

This Caleb was a remarkable character, and numerous notices appear in the Gentlemen's Magazine and other papers of the time. He was born as above stated in 1734, and was a wine merchant in London, where he married Miss Sidney, in 1800; and died in 1810, leaving four children. I have found no trace of the after history of these children.

Ensign Whitefoord of the 15th. Regiment was wounded in one of the Canadian actions, in 1814, as mentioned in Gen. Prevost's dispatches, and Captain J. A. Whiteford was severly wounded at Waterloo. In 1820 he was promoted to major and in 1822 he seems to have left the service or died.

In 1827 Rev. George Whitefoord, rector of Westerfield, in Suffolk, married Arabella, second daughter of Geo. Windham of Cromer.

John R. Whitefoord was knighted by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, March 7, 1811, and is perhaps identical with the John Roussel et Whiteford, sometimes styled baronet.

Sir George, resident of Dublin 1825, had been Sheriff of that city at the time of George IV's visit to Ireland, and was knighted by his majesty in person in September 1821.

The first of this family was walter de Whitefoord. who for his good service at the battle of the Larts, A. D. 1263, in the regiment of Alexander the third, under the command of Alexander Seneschal, high Steward of Scotland, received from him the lands of Whitefoord near Paisley in the Shire of Renfrew.

There is a tradition that one of the heads of the family in the time of King Robert, the Bruce, surprised a party of English on the opposite side of the River Cart by a stratagem of putting great quantities of sheaves of wheat and corn in the water, and to perpetuate the event, the wheat sheaves are borne in the family arms (Nisbet's Heraldry).

Having no authentic evidence of his descent, Mr. Whiteford in March 1840, obtained a grant from the College of Arms, of this coat, Viz: Argent, a bend sable cotized azure, between two garbs of the last: and for his crest; in front of a garb azure banded, or a shield argent, charged with a bend sable, cotised of the first; over the crest, the

motto, "Repos Aillieurs", and beneath the shield "Virtute Superanda Fortuna".

Extinct Baronetcies, Scotland.

Whitefoord of Blairguham, in the county of Ayr, descended from the younger son of Whitefoord of that ilk, who took up his residence in the Shire of Ayr, with his brother, who was Abbott of Corsragwall. James V. were designated Heritable Coroners of the Jurisdiction of Carrick, and intermarried at various periods with many eminent Northern houses, Blair of that Ilk, Kennedy of Ardmillan, Cathcard of Carnock, Inglis of Shiel. Its representatives, Sir Adam, Bart., of Blairguhan, married Margaret, only daughter of Allan, Lord Cathcart, and by her, who died in January 1742, he had issue, which, however, and she have both become extinct. - Arms a band between two cotises, sable with a garb in chief of the last.

The other night I happened to look in some reference books and found some information about the battle of Largs and Alexander III of which there is mention in the Whitford Papers.

Alexander III, 1241-1286, King of Scots
Succeeded to the throne in 1249 at the age of eight years. His father, Alexander II, died on a campaign against the Norse Kingdom of the Hebrides. A great Norwegian invasion in 1263 was repulsed at the battle of Largs in which storm and plague aided the Scots. This was the battle in which Walter de Whitefoord gave good service for which he received the lands of Whitefoord in the Shire of Renfrew.

Again, I hope you can use some of this information.

The Great Charta which King John was forced to grant to the English
Barons at Runnymede in 1215 is one of the Chief Documents of English
Constitutional History and the forerunner of our own Bill of Rights.

The Barons had accused John of violating their feudal rights, and
when his position was weakened by his defeat at the hands of Philip II
of France, at Bovines, July 1214, they formed a confederation demanding
their rights.

The Great Charta consisted of 61 clauses, one of which we are most interested in.

This clause reads that all persons of noble birth or those titled could only be tried by a jury of their peers, and that there could not be undue delay in convening the court. This meant an end to the absolute power of life and death which King John had held over his court.

The Magna Charta did not affect the status of the commoner and so it was necessary to list all persons entitled to this protection.

The listings included here all contain the name Whitford and whom they are descended from. Each pertinent list has an asterick as does the name Whitford.

An interesting side light, --- Originally several copies of the Magna

Charta were made so that they might be kept in different places for safe

keeping and during World War II one of the originals was placed in our

Library of Congress for safe keeping.



#### FOREWARD

The following historical notes and remarks were written by my father, Colonel John D. Whitford, at New Bern, North Carolina November 23, 1898. He was at that time in possession of a more thorough knowledge of details concerning the Whitford family than anyone then/living. All of his life he was ever alert in collecting facts and figures relating not only to his ancestors, but also in matters of historical interest connected with his native state of North Carolina. He was born in New Bern, August 17th., 1825, and died there September 13th., 1910, at the age of 85 years.

He had always been of wonderful usefulness to the state both commercially and socially, filling many positions of honor and trust.

No date is given. The amount involved is given - 250,000 pounds sterling. Kirkham further mentions a part of the family, Maria Mangin Brown. Her maiden name was Maria Charlotte Sophia Mangin, and her grandmother's maiden name was Soroli Kemp. These Whitfords go back several centuries. I have always understood the original name was Whiteford - Burns, the poet however, alludes to Whitford Hill. John Whitford (of course these Whitfords were all English people) came to this country before 1700 and settled near Snow Hill in Maryland. He afterwards removed to Virginia where his son Martin Whitford was born (penciled note says about 1705 -MS), who came to North Carolina in 1722 and settled near the road that ran from New Bern to Bath in Beaufort County, which is the oldest town in the state. The settlement of Martin Whitford was in the precinct of Little Swift Creek. There he married Sarah, or Sally, Perifoi, afterwards called Purify. It is a Swiss-French \*2 name. By the marriage was born David and John Whitford and several girls. David was the father of Hardy Whitford, the father of John D. Whitford, who is the father of Reid Whitford. Thomas H. Gaskins' grandfather was this John, brother of David, who was the

father of David R. Whitford. The latter never married, though he lived to be a good old age. David Whitford (penciled note says married Oct. 29, 1789), my grandfather, married Ann (marked out and "Nancy" written above - MS) Stilley, and were born to them ten children, five boys and five girls named as follows: Sally, Hardy, Ann. Nathan, John, Sina, David Purify, Narcissa Melissa and Bryan. Their father and mother lived to see them all grown and married - now all are dead with children and grandchildren scattered about the state and in other states. Col. John N. Whitford (first cousin of John D., according to penciled note) was the son of Nathan Whitford (above this name is penciled "uncle".) It is a singular fact that grandmother's (Stilley's note (family came too from near Snow Hill, Maryland, although they were unacquainted there with the Whitford family and the first meeting was in Craven County with the result as before stated. I was about grown when my grandparents died, first grandmother, after the death of my own father which occurred in May 1841. She was 80 then, and grandfather died at 84. He was all English in appearance, with ruddy complexion. what was right with him was right and what was wrong was wrong, and there he stood forcibly and undismayed. But, when he knew he was wrong he would admit it, at once, and did not hesitate to declare it to the world. He was a preacher of the Ironside Eaptist kind. In his last days I used to ride about the roads near his house with him, on horseback, always carrying his servant Bill, also on horseback, whom he would keep behind him and me. The old man then was nearly blind. Now and then he would call out "Bill, where are?" "I am", would be the answer, "Master, behind Mars Johnny". that was me, but in fact we would be side by side, very often, as I liked to talk with Bill and did not want grandfather to know it. He was exceedingly gentle with me at all times, and in any place. I made and carried over some fireworks one Christmas and startled the country with them. Now those people see as much of such exhibitions as I do, as, on all public occasions they are in New Bern. Then that was away, away in the country. The visits I refer to were after my father's death, though before then I would, with my brother, go to him and it was a joyful time to get ready, as well as the visits. I was eating the bread and sleeping the sleep of a boy, strong, well and happy. Would I go back, and come forward again through all the pain and anxiety of my life, now a long one, to experience such pleasures? I should hesitate. It is well to go on though the end must necessarily be near, now, over the allotted time by three years or more, and my cup has had much bitter mixed with the sweet. There is always an offset to every pleasure. Jon't forget this fact. It is the lot of everyone and those that only have one hand in the fire think they suffer as those do ith both hands in - they, too are unhappy. One mosquito, however, cannot kill while many can torment one to death. Such is life as God made it, therefore there can be no error in it. Lature can't err. hat is was to be and what was to be is right. All things in sight whether the sun, moon or stars must die. Things that are ever to exist we cannot see, they are over the unknown river and beyond mortal vision. The Bible tells us "sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof". Evil here means trouble (as the preacher told us Sunday last) and not to anticipate it. Therefore we were made to bear the trouble and anxiety and pain of the passing day, though not to run back and bring days of trouble forward or to reach ahead and anticipate others expected to come. God plainly says it was not intended in our creation. Those who live in the past always do so unhappily, those in the future are not less unfortunate. "Give us our daily bread" is the unering prayer.

Act upon it literally and we are safe. Christians should certainly and sinners should try to do so. But I will stop moralizing and go back to the family record.

One of the Purify's, Nicholas, was arrested on the same day with grandmother Clark's father, John James \*3, because they would not take the "test oath" to support the established church of England - that is the Episcopal Church. I have the original record of the Court before me. They both give bond to appear at the next term of the County Court - 1739 - They were called "Dissenting Protestants". There was finally a compromise with them by allowing them in the cath of "Allegiance and Supremacy" to except from the thirty-nine "Articles of Religion" and the thirty-sixth and latter part of the twenty-seventh. Thus it is seen that these men had the courage of their convictions. They were here defying the King, his supporters, and officers without fear of their power to jail.

Grandfather Whitford's mother and old Professor Purify's father were brother and sister. He finally got his name "Purifoy". He was, too, a "istinguished Baptist preacher and stood among the first in the faculty of Wake Forest College in its early days. I knew his granddaughter well. Mrs. Johnson, who among other incidents in her grandfather's life gave the following; the old professor, early in the late Civil War was chaplain in a North Carolina Regiment where he was greatly respected and much beloved for his intelligence and piety by both officers and men. The Regiment went over to Tennessee. One day there, at a grand review, the Professor was riding with the commanding "General" and the staff. Coming to the North Carolina Regiment, the boys struck up

"And Angelina you've got to die and so have you Mr. Purify".

This was repeated by all others in the line. While old Mr. Purify raised his hat and rode on with the staff convulsed with laughter. Now for the story. Mr. Purify would leave home to spend a day preaching elsewhere and sometimes become so interested in his meeting that he would remain several days, forgetting he had made no provision in the meantime for his wife and children. This would nettle the old lady who would on sight begin to upbraid him for the negligence. He would in answer say to her, "Remember, Angelina, you have to die" and she would invariably reply "And so have you Mr. Purify". The soldiers from about his home carried it in the Army with them. I knew the old Professor during his life. Uncle David Purify Whitford named his eldest son for him. Adison Purify.

I will say something in relation to the Reids.

Elizabeth Maid married James Reid and had one child Mary Jane Reid, the mother of my children. Her parents both died when she was two years of age. They were both low country people living near the "Richlands" and not far from Little River and North East Creek in Onslow County, North Carolina. It was deemed best to sell the place as it was about to be ruined by pilferers. Mary Jane was called "Jeanie" from her early childhood. Mrs. James Stevenson - whose father was her guardian - however, always called her Mary. The country people drawling out for "Janie" - "Jeanie" - it got fixed upon her. Daniel Newton of Onslow

County was Elizabeth Reid's grandfather, thus the name, in the Sanders and Russell family of Daniel and in the former, the name of Newton. They were all pretty closely related. \*4 James Reid was a well made man with clear complexion with light hair, whose weight was one hundred and eighty pounds, generally. He died with bilious fever at Smith's Mills - Now Maysville on the Wilmington and New Bern Railroad, in the 32nd. year of his age. Daniel Newton was with him at the time and they were on the way to New Bern. rr. Reid had a brother for some time clerk of the County Court in which is Knoxville, Tenn. Both Mrs. Reid and her daughter must have resembled strongly Mrs. Noel, nee Margaret Sanders. She was the daughter of Dr. Benjamin Sanders who was a brother of Jeanie Reid's guardian Daniel Sanders, who moved from Onslow to Mississippi, carrying his family, where Margaret married Noel as above. She wrote from there in 1858, as follows; "Dearest Jeanie-One evening (she is referring to her aunt) we were talking of your mother. She loved to talk of Her. "We loved each other as well as you and Jeanie, Maggie", said Aunty. "We were near the same age, went to school together and were more intimate than any other girls during our girlhood". How I wish you could have heard her speak of your mother. Said she had the fairest complexion she ever saw and peach blossom cheeks. "You remember Mrs. Hornablow used to call your cheeks "peach blooms". I thought of it when she mentioned your mother. While we were talking of her Mrs. Noel came in and told me to give her love to you. "the child of her earliest and dearest friend". This Mrs. Noel was Mrs. Margaret Noel's husband's mother, all formerly of Onslow County. North Carolina.

It is doubtful whether a better formed woman could have been found in this state than Jeanie Reid. At the great railroad ball given here before the war, Bishop Watson, then Dr. Watson, was present at the supper, and recollecting it until this day, he told my daughter Bessie Whitford Slover a year or two ago he should never forget the beauty of her mother's arms, neck and chin. At the time she weighed about 150 pounds but before her death her weight increased to 184 pounds. Yet she was such a neat figure, no one would ever have dreamed she was so heavy. She had an intellectual head and forehead. Her disposition was naturally amiable and she was entirely clear of envy and foolish jealousy. But she too was gifted with satire to a remarkable degree. which she held down except, now and then, to playfully annoy her friends, especially the males. She never had to do her work over. She was careful not to wound anyone if it could possibly be avoided. When we were married, January 1851, she was 22 and I 26. She died in July 1865 leaving eight children as follows: William, Mary James Clark (penciled note: St. Mary's Convent of Sacred Heart, N. Y. died Young - MS), Reid, Jeanie, Clark, Bessie, Johnes Dalton (penciled note: Aunt Honey - MS) and Orlena Holland. The last survived her mother but a few days, was named for the sister of an officer Colonel Holland of Mississippi whom I knew in the army.

I would mention here that there was a William Bastin Whitford who owned the Academy Square, New Bern, North Carolina, his residence having been on the corner of it, opposite to George Roberts late residence. The Father of Elijah Clark, William Clark, lived on the corner southwest from Whitford's house. His wife was Sally (note penciled says: Mary) Willis. Thus Charles C. Clark's father, William Willis Clark. I find in the old records of the County Court a Thomas Whitford, and from the bonds he appears or must have been a man of means. Some other Whitfords came here from Tennessee in late years. I do not be-

lieve they were related to our stock at all. Grandfather Whitford was a soldier in the Revolutionary War for a time, though not much more than a boy and Hardy Whitford, my father, was in the war of 1812-15. This is a matter of record at Washington. Hardy Whitford died in the 48th. year of his age. He had hair (dark brown) very much like my son William, and his teeth, to the last, were perfect. In his dress he was a pattern of neatness. His conversational powers were more than ordinary and what he could do at all was done quickly. He was a little below my (5 ft. 10 in. ) height. Jeanie Reid was about 5 feet 5 inches in height. Number 3 were easy fitting shoes for her feet. Her hands were well formed and of medium size. Her face was oval, hair light, eyebrows dark, eyes blue. My daughter Mary and Bessie combined could have made an excellent representation of her though both some higher in stature. I will state here that Hardy and Mary James Clark Whitford had three children - William Clark, John Dalton and Elizabeth Ann, the latter named for her two grandmothers and they were both living when she was born, and for some time afterwards. John D. Whitford was named for his uncle John D. Clark.

# FOOTNOTES

- \*1 He was afterwards accidentally killed, soon after the presentation of the list of Whitfords to me, on Neuse River while fishing.
- \*2 One half of Bern is French and called Beone (Bevna). The Grench pronunciation Purefoi called Purifoy then. It will be hereafter seen old Professor Purifoy of Wake Forest College, adopted the French pronunciation for spelling his name foy instead of foi.
- \*3 He lived at the time in the house at the commer of Change and Craven Streets, opposite to our house, where Aunt Jane and family lived so long. He had the house erected the frame is from poles (small trees) cut on the lot in about 1725. When the house some years ago was reweather-boarded, I saw the frame as described above.
- We were intimate political and personal friends. He died during the second session and I was chairman of the Committee to make arrangements for his burial. Govrnor Daniel Russel's wife is his daughter. Gov. Russell, a boy, was at my wedding with his father and stepmother. They gave us a big party at their home in Brunswick County, N. C. The Governor's father was named Daniel, and his mother was Caroline Sanders, David Sander's daughter. Daniel Russell was David Sander's best man and at the wedding declared he would wait and marry his first daughter and he did twenty and more years afterwards. She died in giving birth to Gov. Daniel Russell. Her brother Benjamin- there were but two of them soon afterwards died at New Bern, with Bilious fever, with which he was suffering when he arrived there seeking the aid of our physicians.

# MR. NUNN'S ADDRESS OF FRIDAY EVENING May 16, 1919

Delivered on the occasion of the Presentation of the Historical Books of Col. Whitford to the Library Association of New Bern, N. C.

Mayor Edward Clark presented the Historical Books of Col John D. Whitford, which had been donated by his son, Mr. Reid Whitford, This gift was accepted on behalf of the Association by the President, Mr. T. A. Green.

Judge O. H. Guion in his usual pleasant manner introduced the speaker of the evening, Hon. R. A. Nunn, who gave the following sketch of Col. Whitford's life, as follows:

well, John R. Justice, william H. Washington, George S. Stevenson,

"The late Col. John D. Whitford, son of Hardy Whitford, and Mary J. Clark, his wife, was like many of our best and most useful men, of English and Scotch-Irish ancestry. He was born in New Bern, Wednesday, 17 August, 1825. Through both parents he was related to many of the first families in the county. His father was a prominent merchant in this town 100 years ago. As a boy he attended the old New Bern Academy and had the educational advantages of that old institution where several men afterwards famous received their training. He did not pursue his studies in college nor university, but such was his diligence in acquiring knowledge of people, public affairs and commercial interest, and so great was his love for books, history and general literature, he was early recognized as an accomplished scholar of great learning and unusual talent and distinguished for his retentive memory of folks and events. When he was barely 21 years of age he was elected Mayor of the town, or Intendent, as the office was then designated. He always manifested practical and substantial interest in the development of the community and as soon as he was placed at the head of the local government and such schemes characterized his whole active life. Under his administration the streets were improved, ponds were drained, old creek bottoms filled in, and brick sewers, then called acqueducts, constructed for drainage purposes. Every now and then some of these old acqueducts are found when excuvations are made and they never fail to excite interest because none of this generation knows how or when they were built so far beneath the present surface, but as a fact they are or were among the first if not the very first underground brick acqueducts constructed in the state. He also promoted and caused to be erected the beautiful shell-rock wall around Cedar Grove Cemetery to protect the burying ground from the hogs, goats, and cattle, which roamed at large all around and over the town in those days. He believed in the enforcement of the town ordinances and it is related that on one occasion when he had caused a woman of some prominence to be arrested for violation of the new ordinances designed to protect pedestrains and duly made and provided to prevent and remedy the common evil of throwing waste water from the windows of houses, most of which were built flush with the street and with porch and steps jutting out halfway across the sidewalk, he resisted all appeals of influential friends of the "Isdemeanant and went on with the prosecution and pronounced the offender guilty, but having demonstrated that justice is blind, he exemplified that it is also merciful, by paying the ten dollar fine be which he imposed. Well a bar 2001 Al formal mo arred wall of boar and no

"After his term of service as Mayor, he was appointed United States Collector of Customs at this port. New Bern then enjoyed a large coastwise and foreign trade. A great many vessels were owned by residents of the town and a thriving export and import trade was carried on estensively. The office of collector was therefore an important and responsible position.

"Soon after this he began to devote much of his time to the great work of his life. As a young man he enjoyed the friendship of William Gaston he remembered as a small child, John Stanly, and he had imbibed the spirit and hope of these men and of Judge A. D. Murphey, and others like him, who on the early days of our progress had the vision to see what North Carolina was destined to be when the natural resources of the state were developed. He joined hands with men like Col. Peter G. Evans, Alonzo T. Jerkins, William G. Bruan, Charles Slover, John Blackwell, John R. Justice, William H. Washington, George S. Stevenson, Moses W. Jarvis, Edward R. Stanly, Fred P. Latham, Israel Disosway, Hardy B. Lane, James C. Stevenson, George Green, Henry G. Cutler, Alexander Miller, and Alexander Mitchell, and fired them with enthusiasm and ambition to execute the plans and hopes of the leading men of the previous generation, and through his untiring efforts and life management the great plan of joining the east and west assumed form and life.

"The Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad Company having been incorporated by the General Assembly of 1853, the first meeting of the stockholders was held in the courthouse at New Bern, Wednesday, 14 July 1854. The minutes of the meeting show that the action to organize was made by John D. Whitford, Esq. The first general meeting of the stockholders was held 20 and 21 July, 1854, and the company organized and John D. Whitford, At. T. Jerkins, E. R. Stanly, R. N. Taylor, F. P. Latham, Wm. P. Moore, George Green and George S. Stevenson were elected directors, and by them Mr. Whitford was elected president of the company. He was still a very young man for such a position and the responsibility it entailed. When his selection was considered a signal honor at the time, yet it was universally agreed that no man was more deserving. Without interruption he continued as president for ten years with most gratifying success.

"In his report to the stockholders in July, 1855, Mr. Whitford speaking of the object of the company said; 'The importance of the great work before us cannot but be apparent to every man from Beaufort to Goldsboro; yes from the ocean to the mountains. The project was conceived a quarter of a century ago, and originated in the patriotic minds of such men as william Gaston, John Stanly and John Washington. They believed it to be a great work of deep interest to the state, and which was to be an important contributor to its resources. Let us then imitate the example of those great and good men. Let us work constantly and energetically to the day of its completion - dear to their virtues and memory, a noble monument - bequeath to our children and posterity a precious legacy, and reap for ourselves a glorious reward.'

"At the meeting in Fuly 1865, he reported that of the three locomotives ordered by the company, two of them, viz. the 'Gov. Bragg', and 'Charles F. Fisher" had been delivered, and that the third, the 'John Becter' should be ready as soon as required. He described them as first class engines and proudly reported that the 'Gov. Bragg' was put in motion on the road at New Bern, on March 15, 1865, and a few days later delivered

to Mr. Stanly, one of the contractors with a train of platform cars, and had since that time run about 2,000 miles without a screw having been loosed, or one cent paid for repairs, except for slight damage received by the accidental falling of a shell

"These locomotives would be curious things now. They had no cover for the boiler and when it was wet and chilled by rain the steam went down and the train came to a standstill; wood was burned as fuel and the strong draft threw great sparks out through the balloon shaped stacks and passengers wore linen dusters to protect their clothing from dirt, soot and live cinders. The regulations provided that the greatest care must at all times be taken to avoid the scattering of sparks, cinders or fire in any shape from the engine chimneys; that steam must be shut off and the damper closed before the engine reached bridges which must be crossed in no case faster than six miles per hour and care must be taken not to slide the wheels except in case of imminent danger. The railroad tickets read; "Kinston to Goldsboro" or other points, and bore in addition what would now be significant, the words "One Seat".

"A year later, 16 July 1857, President Whitford stated to the stock-holders that Miss Sarah B. Metts was the only lady who had taken stock in the A. & N. C. road; he therefore moved that she be allowed a free ticket for life, on the entire line. The motion carried unanimously and by acclamation.

"Miss Metts afterwards married Mr. T. J. Mitchell, long a prominent business man of this city, and is the mother of Messrs. T. J. Mitchell and J. G. Mitchell. She enjoyed the pass to the end of her life.

"On the 1 January, 1857 the track having been laid to Core Creek, a second class passenger car was placed on the road and run with the construction train, for the accommodation of passengers in connection with the New Bern, Kinston and Goldsboro line of stages. By this time another locomotive, the 'John Stanly' had been acquired and the company had other elaborate equipment consisting of one second class passenger car, four house cars, twenty platform cars, sixteen gravel cars, and two hand cars, and the president was trying to get a contract with the United States to carry the mails.

"8 January 1858, the train passed over Neuse River and ran through to Kinston; on the 29 April the road was opened to Goldsboro; on the 19 February, 1858, Trent River was spanned with a bridge and the first crossing of the locomotive was announced with the roar of cannon and huzzas of many hundred people, who had assembled to witness this feat. The 31 May brought the tracks of Gov. Morehead and Mr. Wood, contractors, together, and on the 7 June, the first train ran through from Goldsboro to the ocean. President Whitford describing this says; "A most singular and happy co-incident, without any preconcerted arrangement or knowledge of what each other were doing, at the very moment, when thousands of fair daughters and distinguished sons of the good old North State, had assembled in the west, around the base of a column, eager and breathless to catch the eloquent words that fell from the lips of a patriotic citizen. in praise of him to whom it was erected, we were then engaged in the east completing a monument, to the great projector of railroads, more lasting than stone and more durable than adamant- the cherished schene of his life, uniting the east and the west in iron bonds and

perpetual brotherhood. But when they all have crumbled to dust and shall have passed from the memory of man, then will the practical wisdom and sound forecast, the spotless names and glorious deeds of a Caldweel and a Gaston stand bright upon the pages of their country's history, and shine and continue to shine, and illuminate the pathway of generations yet unborn.

"These locomotives would be surjous things now. They had no "In these arid days of war regulations, Reed amendments and 6onstitutional provisions, for fear of violating prohibition laws and regulations, I must refrain from describing in detail the celebration held at New Bern to chronicle the first arrival of a train with passengers and freight by rail from the west. The invitation of the inhabitants of the town was extended and met with generous response. Heavily laden trains from the Wilmington and Weldon, North Carolina, Raleigh and Gaston and Western North Carolina roads as well as the A. & N. C. road, brought thousands and thousands of people. A Great dinner was provided and barrels of liquor and many, many dozen cases of champagne consumed. A vessel from New York brought the wet goods and the country was scoured for pigs, chickens, turkeys, and everything good to eat. Our distinguished subject reports to his stockholders; 'Nothing occurred by accident, or otherwise, to mar the pleasure of any, and all returned to their homes loud in expressions for the success of our enterprize and the welfare of our people. "From June, 1865, Mr. Whitford was not president of the A. & NC road. In 1866, he was elected to the State Senate from Craven County (penciled note says he was chairman of the committee that designed the state flag, while in the state senate) and received a larger number of votes than any man had been honored with up to that time for public office in the county. In June 1866, he was again president of the rail-road company and at the stockholders' meeting 27 June, 1867, the following resolution was adopted; "Resolved that the thanks of the stockholders are eminently due, and are hereby tendered to John D. Whitford, Esq., for his able and efficient administration of the affairs of this company during the last year - more especially does this company owe to his untiring energy the funding of the remainder of the debt due to the state, and thereby rendering it possible for the stockholders to realize within a reasonable time some return for their investments.

"Several times afterwards he was re-elected president of the company. It was a position much sought after and parents held out to their sons as a reward for merit the possibility of being president of the A. & N. C. Railroad Company, President of the United States or Governor of North Carolina.

"In his 26th, year on the 15 January 1851, Mr. Whitford married Miss Jeanie Reid of Wilmington, N. C. To them were born seven children, viz. William Whitford (note says; University of Va. Grad), brilliant lawyer, who died in early manhood; Miss Mary Whitford, now deceased; Capt. Reid Whitford, Civil Engineer, who resides in Charleston, S. C.; Miss Jeanie Reid, who married W. P. Fife; Clark Whitford, who lived in Missippi most of life and died there several years ago; Miss Bessie, who married Dr. George Slover of New Bern; Miss Johnes Dalton who married Dr. C. Williams Bailey of Georgetown, S. C.; and Orlena Sheltton, who died in infancy.

Mr. Whitford was an active fireman in the volunteer department of the town and for a long time was foreman of one of the companies.

"He was a prominent and a most enthusiastic Mason, a member of St. John's Lodge for more than half a century, and was exalted to the sublime and honorable degree of Royal Arch Mason. (Note says; Master of the Lodge; gave oil portrait of himself to it).

"When the New Bern Light Infantry, a local military company was organized, he promptly became a member, and from this company he and Jacob Brookfield were the two first volunteers for service in the Civil War. In the Confederate service he was commissioned first as Captain, then as Major, and just prior to the coming of peace he was promoted to a Colonelcy. He saw service with General L. O. B. Branch, was in the Battle of New Bern and in the fighting around Kinston and other places. But on account of his special railroad experience, railroad men being scarce in those days, he was placed in charge of the transportation of troops and munitions of war through North Carolina by the Confederate States Government. He was also State agent for the purchase of calvary equipment and other war materials. His service was so useful it brought to him a most complimentary letter from General Robert E. Lee.

"4 July, 1859, the New Bern Light Infantry, 'As a token of respect and esteem' publicly presented Mr. Whitford an elegant punch pitcher cast from silver dollars donated by several members of the Company.

"Before the Civil War he was director of the North Carolina railroad company and was also a member of the State Commission for the improvement of the Neuse River.

"He was a member of the convention which passed the Ordinance of Seccession.

"He was a delegate to the River and Harbor Convention held in Savannah in 1884 and after that for a period was Superintendant of certain river improvements in North Carolina made by the national government. Immediately following the Civib War he was instrumental in establishing in New Bern the firm of Whitford Dill and Company, shipping and commission merchants, and agents for Murry, Ferris and Company, owners of the first line of steamers successfully operated between New Bern and New York. He was also a member of the brokerage house of John F. Pickrell & Co., 143 Broadway, New York. He was indeed a man of unusual ability, broadminded, and always possessed the courage of his convictions, outspoken and taking the initiative in public enterprises and always bending his activities to the upbuilding of his home town and the advancement of the commercial importance of New Bern.

"In disposition he was generous to a fault, amiable, kind, fair and just. In manner was cordial, cheerful and most attractive. He was by nature an instructor and builder. When I was a small child I used to play in his yard a good part of my time with his grandson, John D. Whitford, Jr., for whom he built a minature railroad, and which every child in the neighborhood enjoyed. Like every big-brained, kind-hearted, strong man I have ever known, he loved to see things grow, and had a large and wonderful garden full of apple trees, peaches, pears, figs and grape vines, to say nothing of radishes and other things children are crazy about. We looked forward with great eagerness to the times when the Colonel would take us through the garden. I well recollect the first time I ever heard of the amazing story of the scientists about the beginning of the world and the origin of the universe. Colonel Whitford sat on the steps of his home and graphically pictured and explained to his grandson and myself what in later years

came to know as the nebular hypothesis.

"Through his long life he had treasured in his memory more facts and accounts of by gone days than any one in this community. He was the best authority on local history and was distinguished as an anitquarian. He was interesting at all times, well liked, honored and popular. In the prime of his life it was said that no man in North Carolina knew by name and face as Colonel Whitford except possibly Governor Zeb Vance.

"It is difficult for us of this generation to realize the tremendous obstacles that stood in the way of building a railroad 65 or
70 years ago. It is an Herculean job now, but Col. Whitford and his
associates wrought in the days of human slavery, before the time of
applied electricity, automobiles, motion pictures, flying machines
or wireless telephones were known; when water was taken from the town
pump; chunks of fire borrowed from the neighbors or tediously kindled
from flint and punk; tallow candles shed their feeble light and meals
were cooked in the fire place; but then as now the minds of progressive
men looked forward.

"He lived in the period of the greatest development the world has ever known. In his time the United States expanded from the narrow margin of states along the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific, and across the Pacific. It was the beginning of the era of canals and railroads, in fact there was no railroad when he was born and the first steamboat crossed the Atlantic Ocean only six years before. The railroads in his early days consisted of wooden or iron rails over which cars were drawn by horses at a speed of 5 or 6 miles an hour. During his life the telegraph was invented; coal was first successfully used as fuel; agricultural implements like the reaping machines, binders, mowers, threshing machines, and rotary printing presses and sewing machines, came into use; india rubber was found fit for commercial purposes; revolving pistols and improved firearms manufactured; coal oil lamps and illuminating gas generally adopted. The Baltimore and Chio Railroad Company in 1827 was using horse drawn cars. In 1830 only 23 miles of railroad was in operation in the United States; in 1850 when he began the agitation for the building of the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad from the Ocean to Goldsboro there were about 3,000 miles of railroads in the whole country. Ten years later there were more than 30,000 miles, all due to men of indomitable courage, foresight and ceaseless energy. Such men were the builders of the nation.

Probably no man has ever lived in New Bern who was more useful in developing certain features of our commercial life. He provided transportation by land and water. Undoubtedly the people of the east who now enjoy the fruits of his labor owe to him a debt of gratitude, which should never be forgotten. He lived to see the great celebration which was held in 1910 to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the foundation of the town. As a courtesy to him the parade was arranged to pass his house and he was visibly affected as he witnessed from his window the floats depicting the events in our history in which he had so large a share. A few months later, 13 of September, 1910 he died and a long life of honor and usefullness in the 86th year of his age.

More than figuratively was Myrtle Gould Whitford the light of George Corbishley's life. She lived in a lighthouse.

Corbishley is a young businessman of Riverside, R. I. Myrtle is the youngest daughter of Charles Whitford, keeper of the Cabin Point beacon in upper Narragansett Bay, hale a mile off the mainland.

They used to meet at school, and at parties in the town, and George was stricken early with her charms. Evenings he would sit in rapturous contemplation of the flashing beacon across the frothy water, though he found the light less dazzling than her eyes.

Then young Corbishley began rowing over to the Whitford's house. So did various rivals. But Myrtle soon discovered that the latter were fair-weather friends, while neither storm nor gale kept George from keeping his dates.

And so they were married. About 50 friends left the mainland the other day in dories and motorboats, with flowers and flower-girls, a minister and a best man, and a launch full of presents. The austere old lighthouse on its rocky, spray-swept base was transformed into a wedding bower. With infinite care, Mrs. Whitford had prepared a lighthouse cake and a wedding breakfast to be served on the runway surrounding the building high above the water.

It was on that runway that Myrtle, now 18, had learned to walk. Her parents were transferred to the Sebine Point light shortly before she was born.

The ceremony was held in the Stone-walled living room. The light-house bell was rung, and an aunt of the bride played the wedding march while the party moved down from above. During the wedding breakfast on the balcony, passing ships sounded their signals and smaller craft encircled the light, whistling salutes to the bride and bridegroom.

Then the lighthouse keeper's daughter and her husband went down to the confetti-strewn sea and rowed to the mainland, where he had a home prepared. After the honeymoon, in the mountains, they'll begin (yes you guessed it) light housekeeping.

# BIOGRAPHY

Elder David Whitford, the subject of this short biographical sketch, was born August the 8th., A. D. 1764. His education was very limited. He was received and baptised in the church at Swift Creek, Craven County A. D. 1788, and in 1804 he was chosen by the church to the office of deacon, which station he filled.

He commenced preaching by liberty obtained from the church July A. D. 1808. He was set apart by the church and ordained the 6th. day of August, 1825, and took the pastoral care of the said church and continued to be their pastor until A. D. 1847, and having become blind and worn out by infirmities and old age he resigned his office as pastor of the church.

He was blessed with a loving wife, Nancy Stelley, who was received in the same church with him A. D. 1803. They lived in union together and raised ten children; and both lived to see the greater part of them embrace the same like precious faith with themselves. His wife died August, A. D. 1843 and he was left alone as to a helpmate; but he still continued

to persevere in the cause of the Redeemer.

His manner of preaching was not with enticing words as with man's wisdon. He was sound in the faith and a very good experimental preacher. He lived to a good old age, and although he had become blind and infirm, he would still talk of the world to come and speak of the precious hope that he had of a future crown. And although he was deprived of that great blessing called eye sight, he still loved to hear the precious truths of the Bible, and as he could not see how to read them himself he would ask his children to read them for him, and he would sit for hours together and hear, and talk of the goodness of the God and Father of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

But there was one more step for him to take, and but a few hours before he was to take it, he goes to bed one evening after addressing the Throne of Grace, and behold, what do we see and hear? Next morning very soon, on the 8th. of October 1847, why, he that has been faithful to his family, his neighbor, his church, and to his God; is now still and active usefulness now over. And he doubtless is gone to receive that crown laid up in Heaven which Paul spoke of, and that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

Now, reader pause, and reflect, and see if you are pursuing the way that this man has gone, and are your hopes brightened for Meaven and

And if not, May God, by his spirit and Grace quicken you and save you at last is the prayer of all the truly praying people.

The subject of this notice is Brother Bryan C. Whitford, who was born Jan. 16, 1850 and died Sep. 18, 1917 making his stay on earth 67 years, 8 months and 2 days. He was the son of David P. The boys are all married and located not far from the old home.

He was chosen clerk of the church on Saturday, Oct. 6, 1916 which office he filled until death. He loved his profession, always filled his seat at church unless providentially hindered and is greatly missed by the brethern. By order of the church at Macedonia and request of the Whitford Family Reunion, I was called on to write an obituary notice of the late Deacon Addison P. Whitford, who was born September, 7, 1844 and departed this life on the 22nd. day of July, 1934 making his stay on earth 89 years, 10 months and 15 days.

The family from which this dear brother came is not an ignoble one. Many have filled place of public trust and not only felt a deep interest in their immediate families but also a manifest interest in their community and country has been observed. Among his ancestors there has appeared

ministers and bold defenders of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

At the age of 17 years, he entered the Confederate Army, enlisting at New Bern in March 1862. His company was later transferred to the command of Capt. John Whitford when he, by the soldiers was chosen Lieutenant in Company "A" of Colonel Whitford regiment. While on guard at Vanceboro, Lieutenant Whitford with three of his men, were captured by the Union forces, and carried to Point Lookout as prisoners and other places of

confinements, finally came home in June, 1865, shortly before his 21st.

On the 3rd. day of May, 1868, he was married to Miss Pamelia C.
Toler and unto this union were born one son, David P. Whitford and one daughter, Mrs Sina Scott, both which survive together with several grand children and great grand children. His wife Pamelia whitford passed away

I volunteered in 1861 when I was 17 years old. My Cousin, John Whitford, was colonel of the 67th. North Carolina Regiment. It was an artillery regiment. We were stationed at old Fort Brunswick south of Wilmington to defend the Cape Fear River. I was given the rank of lieutenant and was aide-de-camp to the colonel.

We saw no action at Fort Brunswick for almost a year. I had time to ride about the country. I remember there was an old wall of an old brick church standing at the town site. There was a red cedar tree growing on the wall large enough that I climbed up it for some distance. I saw for the first time wet-land rice growing. There was a system of dikes and gates so that the fields could be flooded to kill weeds in the rice fields. There were perhaps 100 slaves on the plantation (I telieve this was Orton Plantation. L.A.W.). This was the first large plantation I had seen. My father had less than 10 negroes, men, women and children, and only one plantation north of Neuse River had as many as 25. I remember particularly a bunch of young negro boys almost too young to work. They were all quartered together and were fed mostly rice. Once on a Sunday night I saw them given scraps of meat and leavings from the plantation Sunday dinner. They fought over these scraps of meat like dogs. On my father's plantation the negroes had always received almost the same food as the white folks, and my mother nursed the sick negroes like they were her own children.

After Burnside began his advance in eastern North Carolina, our regiment was moved to Craven County to help defend New Bern. We were in charge of the artillery. All the guns in the fort were fixed to fire across the river and could only be swung a short distance left and right; all that is, except the two corner guns. These were swivel guns and could be swung in any direction. If all the guns had been swivel type it might have made a difference in the way the battle went. I am not sure though. Gen. Burnside had 15,000 troops and heavy artillery on his gunboats, while Gen. Branch had less than 5,000. Very few of us, except some officers, had ever seen any action and there were several companies of absolutely green militia.

The fort on the river was a well constructed earthwork, and we had adequate ammunition and supplies. Extending south was also earth breastworks to the railroad and beyond. Our defense line ended at a swamp south of the railroad so we could not be flanked. East of the fort along the river and inland the trees had been cut. The criss-crossed logs afforded some protection to us against rapid advance.

The second week in March the Yankee gunboats came up the river and anchored out of range of the fort. We knew a battle was coming. On the afternoon of either March 12 or 13 the Colonel had me ride into town with dispatches to town officials and also letters to his family as to what to do if the fort fell. The only bridge across Trent river except the railroad bridge was five miles up river from New Bern. Someone had laid a walkway across the railroad bridge by putting two 12 inch boards between the rails. My horse was well broken so I rode across the railroad bridge. I finished my business after dark and started back across the bridge. I was about halfway across when suddenly the train came around the curve from Morehead City and onto the bridge. The Yankees had already landed east of the fort and had fired on the train as it went by. It was going much faster than usual. My first thought was to leap off the horse into the river. Before I could act, my horse reared, whirled around and started back toward New Bern at a dead run. I couldn't get off now. I was sure the engineer couldn't see me or wouldn't stop in time. I could hear the train close behind. Then we passed the river shore and my horse leaped down the embankment, and I was safe. I knew there would be no more trains that night but I still went back around by the wagon bridge up river.

The Yankees first started shelling the fort when they were almost out of range. Some of the shells and balls fell short and some didn't explode. In any case we were not harmed. We had good breastworks. Some of the boys were spoiling for a fight. When a shell would hit the top of the breastworks and roll inside they would run after it and spit at it and curse. It's a wonder they didn't get blown up.

When the ships came into range of our guns we began to really damage them. They soon found they couldn't pass and retreated down river out of range and began to land troops. They first tried a direct advance on the fort across the cleared area. The infantry fired on them but we also turned our two swivel guns that way and used grapeshot and canister on them. They soon had to retreat. I later talked to a man who had walked over the field that evening. He said the dead Yankees were so thick you could have almost stepped from one to another. The next attack was made further south out of range of our swivel guns. During the first attack the gunboats kept up their shelling of the fort. They did some damage to the breastworks. During the worst of the battle I was sent with a detail of men to a storage shed south of the fort to get shovels to repair the brestworks. It was the only time I was under heavy fire. You could hear the minnie balls going by a dozen at a time, and squealing when they bounced off the trees. At first I ran dodging from tree to tree, but then I thought that if I was going to be hit, I was going to be hit, so I walked on to the shed in the open. We . got our tools but several bullets went through the shack while we were inside.

Our men stood the attack well for a time but the worst of it came against the center of the infantry line where it was held by green militia. They broke and run. This left us open to a flank attack. Our breastworks were not so good away from the river, we had only two pieces of artillery, the swivel guns, we could use on them so Gen. Branch decided to retreat. The retreat was rapid but orderly. We spiked all guns so they couldn't be fired again by driving a case-hardened rattail file into the touch-hole with a sledge hammer. We also blew up most of our ammunition.

We retreated across Trent River and on up toward Kinston as the Yankees advanced. Our regiment became an infantry regiment and did only skirmish and scout duty for the rest of the war. The Yankees wanted to advance inland and cut the railroad from Wilmington to michmond. There were fights near Kinston and south of Goldsboro. That winter I was stationed in a camp at Goldsboro. I had only been as far away as vilmington and Goldsboro up to that time. One cold night I was on outpost duty at a sawmill near Goldsboro. We burrowed into the sawdust to help keep warm. The next morning we were covered with several inches of snow. It is the only time I ever spent a night out in the snow. The railroad was defended until Fort Fisher fell. We were withdrawn the next spring and defended the north side of Neuse river around New Bern. The Yankees didn't much want to fight over there, as the area was of little importance to them.

They kept a large garrison in the town. If fort with breastworks was built just west of the town. They also kept several armed boats in the river at all times. The Confederates organized what they called The Mosquito Fleet to harass the Yankees. The Fleet was a number of fast rowboats with crews that could row fast or silently too. For a time we were stationed almost directly across river from the town. One rainy night we were on guard along the shore. We had turned over a boat to lie under and keep us out of the rain. That night the Mosquito Fleet attacked and burned the gunboat, Underwrighter. We were less than a half mile from her. The Fleet boats rowed so silently that they were almost on her before the watch heard them. He hailed them and almost at once they were on board. There were several shouts and some shots but the crew was soon overpowered. They were put off in ship boats and then the ship was set on fire. We were under the boat watching her burn when the magazine exploded. We all jumped up and cracked our heads on the boat before we could get out.

Later the Yankees began to land men north of Neuse River so we retreated to the north end of the county. For a while we were stationed at Street's Ferry. Yankee patrols came down frequently to the south side and we fired at each other but no nne tried to cross. Every afternoon just at sundown a cow came down to the river to drink. One afternoon one of the men watching her said "We ain't had any fresh meat in a long time. Let's have some beef." He got down behind a log and sighted over it. When the cow lifted her head, he fired and she dropped. It was over 150 yards. A good shot. We waited until it was almost dark and no Yankees came down to the landing so we rowed over and brought the cow back. We had fresh beef for several days.

We had two jokers in the company, Bill Williams and Sam Turner. They played jokes on each other and everyone else. One day when the river was high and running strong Bill williams went out on the dock and got into a skiff tied there. He lay down on his back and began rocking the boat and singing Rock-a-by-Baby. Sam slipped out on the dock, untied the skiff and dropped the rope in the water. Bill drifted down stream still singing. He didn't realize he was adrift until he run under some branches a half mile down stream. He had to tie the skiff and walk back a half mile through the swamp. There was a group of religious boys in the company who held a prayer meeting almost every night. Someone would read from the Bible and then someone prayed just before taps. One night Sam Turner was called on to pray and he offered a real good prayer. He reached into his pocket and got out his pipe for a last smoke before the drummer beat taps and we had to turn in. "Gosh", he said, "I forgot I had filled it." he was about half through smoking his clay pipe when it exploded and blackened his face. "That damned Bill Williams done that", he said. It was funny to hear him swear like that so soon after he had prayed so fervently.

I was captured twice the last years of the war, and almost captured a third time. Once me and another scout were near Vanceboro. I had a cosuin teaching school in Vanceboro so we went to the school to ask if they had seen any Yankees recently. We tied our horses in a grove behind the school and out of sight, and went into the schoolhouse to ask about the Yankees. Suddenly one of the boys yelled, "The Yankees are coming." my companion run right out the front door where they could see him and was immediately captured. If we had kept quiet it was ten to one they would have passed on by. I was caught inside with no escape so I stepped in the wide chimney and got up on the pot poles that were always put across for hanging pots on. The Yankee came in and looked around and said, "Well, I guess that's all of them." Suddenly a little six-year-old spoke up and said, "There's one more in the chimney." So I was captured. I was put in a camp near Richmond at first. I first saw rocks in the James River and rapids flowing over them. I was later moved to a prison camp at Point Lookout, Maryland, between the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay. In warm weather we were allowed to swim at the point because the Eay was perhaps 30 miles across and the river ten. Several times prisoners swam way out in the river and circled bec' up river past the guards. In almost every case Yankee sympathizers spotted and reported them. One day, however, a real good swimmer announced he was tired of prison life, he set out straight across the Potomec and swam out of sight. We never heard whether he made it, drowned, or made it up-river past the guards. In a few months I was exchanged and when I got home I joined my old company in north Craven County.

The time I was almost captured was also in Vanceboro. I was riding south through the town when a Yankee patrol came around the curve in the road ahead. I spurred my horse to the right toward the creek. When he reached the bank he was going too fast to stop. When he leaped in we both went under and came up halfway across. The Yankees were shooting at me with pistols before we reached the south bank but I was not hit and got away. The second time I was captured I was caught off my horse by a cavalry patrol. I ran out in a field and hid in a ditch. I thought I was going to get away but

te benoitate erew ew elitiv a mo a Yankee spotted me and rode up and captured me. This time I was sent further north. I was imprisoned at Fort Delaware on the Delaware River near New Castle. The first winter was a cold one. We were not given adequate food and allowed only one blanket in reprisal for treatment of Yankee prisoners in Southern camps. Some of the prisoners were from wealthy families and they received money through the lines from home. They were given only script to spend but they could buy extra blankets and food from the stuler's store in the prison. I received no money but since we had to do our laundry I did the laundry for well-to-do prisoners and earned enough to buy an extra blanket and food. When they had the first inspection I lost my extra blanket. Then I heard that sympathetic guards always passed along word of an inspection, so I pulled up a board in the floor under my bunk and hid my blanket there before each inspection. I had to cook the food I bought and wood was scarce. We were always scrounging for wood. We were allowed to get within 20 feet of the fence. One day when the guard was further along I was prying out a piece of wood almost under the fence when I looked up to see the guard with his rifle on me. He could have shot me but he merely said, "Johnny, reach a little further. Ther's a nice stick under the fence". When I got it he made me move away again.

Later the Yankses began to land men north of Yeuse Hiver so we ne-

Lee surrendered in April, I was released sometime in July. I got home just in time to enjoy the first roast'n ears. At home things were not good. All our slaves except one or two old ones had run away to the Yankees. The old ones stayed with us for keep and an occasional dollar until they died. Brother Bryan was just a boy. All my other brothers had been in the army. Only one, Nathan, was wounded. He had a bone shattered in his leg. They saved the leg but it troubled him all his life. Father had joined the home-guard militia late in the war although he was over 50. Periodically both Confederates and Yankees came by the plantation. They took all livestock and most of the other food like salt meat and corn. Once both Yankee and Confederates had been in skirmishes and they took most of Ma's linens for bandages. We kept our cattle and hogs hidden in pastures in the woods. Once Bryan heard the Yankees coming. He had one young mule in the barnyard at the house. He had time to open the gate and drive the mule out. The mule was never caputred. One Yankee swore he would get him but he run himself out without seccess. One of the old slaves kept a musket or two hidden in a hollow tree. He would hunt and bring in an occasional deer pr other game to supplement the meager food supply.

Near the war's end Confederate money was practically worthless and prices were sky-high. Besides there was little to buy. After I returned father moved up into the swamp where he had built a house and left the house at the old Whitford mill. I began to tap pines for turpentine to make a little cash. I was married before 1870 and moved into the old place at the mill. The mill was never in use after the war. Some years later I moved in with Father and lived there until after he died. I built my first house, a log cabin, after Brother Bryan was married and






